The Executive Unit, at all levels, is actively committed to placing all its leaders and employees in a position of accountability towards society and those from whom it accepts support, ensuring the quality of the response and providing relevant results, acknowledging any failures or errors that occur while doing so, and bearing full responsibility.

Data Confidentiality

The Executive Unit ensures the confidentiality of personal data of IDPs collected by the Unit, and not to publish it or allow any party accessing it without the consent of the displaced person.

Quality

The Executive Unit is characterized by a set of characteristics and specifications that meet the explicit and implicit desires and requirements of stakeholders in a timely manner.



Strategic Goals

The Executive Unit is envisioned to evolve into a more professional administrative apparatus for addressing displacement and managing camps in accordance with international standards, aligning with the requirements of national visions and policies. The strategic objectives of the Executive Unit, as per the national policy for addressing internal displacement in Yemen, are outlined as follows:

Introduction

It is our pleasure to present you the Executive Unit's Annual Report (2023) which reflects our achievements during the last year which representing the implementation of our mission and relentless and diligent pursuit to achieve the strategic goals of the Unit in addition to our presence in displacement sites in Ma'rib Governorate. All of that was with an unwavering support provided by Local Authority, represented by Major General Sultan bin Ali Al-Arada - Governor of Ma'rib and member of the Presidential Leadership Council. Executive Unit endeavors to alleviate the suffering of IDPs, and enhance our pivotal role in providing a conducive operational environment for partners to implement their programs and activities. This report reflects the efforts made and provides a narrative of the most prominent achievements made in partnership and coordination with humanitarian organizations.

The report also includes details of the achievements made, projects implemented, beneficiaries, sectoral needs, and lists of partners, supported by statistics and recommendations that can guide humanitarian organizations and agencies in the coming period to alleviate suffering and respond to IDP households. The report also includes long-term recommendations, some of which have already been implemented and some are still open for discussion, as well as proposals and solutions suggested by Executive Unit at all levels. These findings and results were collated through comprehensive field surveys conducted by teams affiliated with the Executive Unit. Through these findings, numerous challenges facing humanitarian efforts in Marib Governorate become evident, affecting IDP life quality. Among the most pressing challenges are threats of eviction and the harsh living conditions experienced by IDP households. The majority of displaced families reside in congested spaces and various forms of temporary shelter, facing difficulties accessing clean water and sanitation systems, along with limited employment opportunities. High unemployment rates exacerbate levels of poverty and total dependence on humanitarian assistance, which only covers %36 of the needs. Moreover, there is also a noticeable shortage in the basic medical services, affecting healthcare in camps. Education challenges are evident in the difficulty to access education, schools lacking necessary resources and qualified teachers. Additionally, IDPs experience instability due to threats and risks in some camps, which will be further addressed in this report. These challenges highlight the escalating hardships faced by displaced households, as despite the assistance provided, coverage often falls short of meeting their needs. Throughout the year, the Executive Unit has acted as a driving force within the humanitarian and relief landscape, propelling the efforts of humanitarian clusters to mobilize resources, bolster the position of partners, and deliver and refine an effective response. The Executive Unit actively participated with all its field and office teams in overcoming challenges, providing support, and facilitating the implementation of activities for all partners. By doing so, the Executive Unit became a powerful voice for those residing in the midst of the suffering.

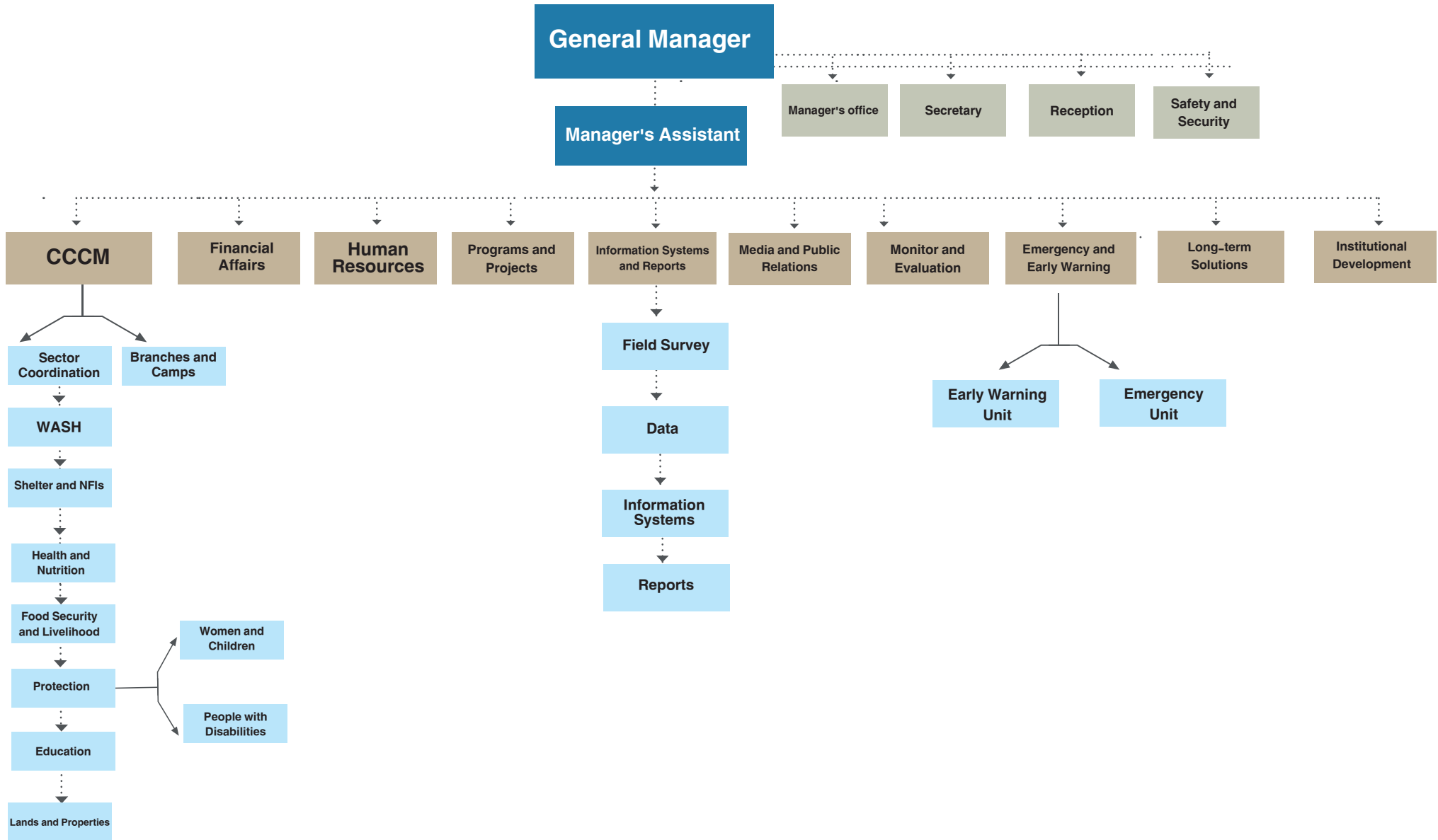

It has also contributed to improving their living conditions in the long term. 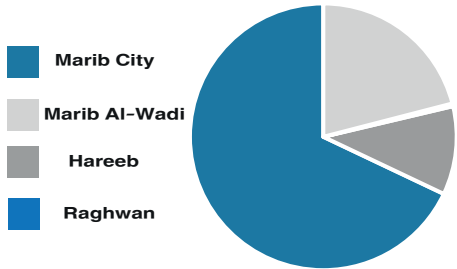

The team of information providers, who work in camps management and affiliated with Executive Unit, monitored a second displacement of (6,422) families, (44,230) individuals, from January to December 2023. Those families were displaced from rented houses into camps due to the following reasons:

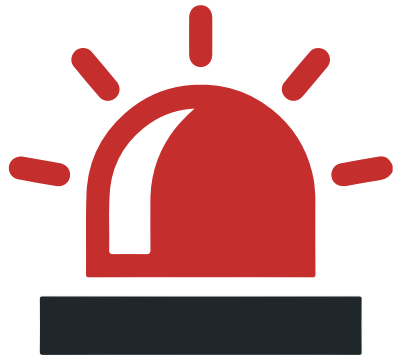
- Economic deterioration as a result of the crisis the country is going through.
- The lack of sustainable income sources for displaced families.
- Thousands of householders face eviction threats due to rent accumulation.
- The humanitarian response toward IDP households living in rented houses is insufficient and the lack of cash assistance projects.

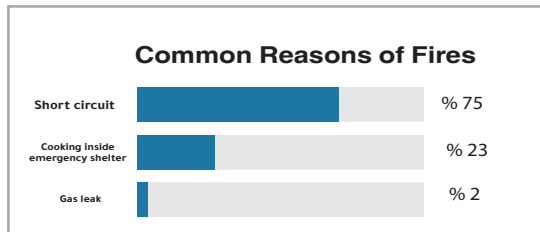
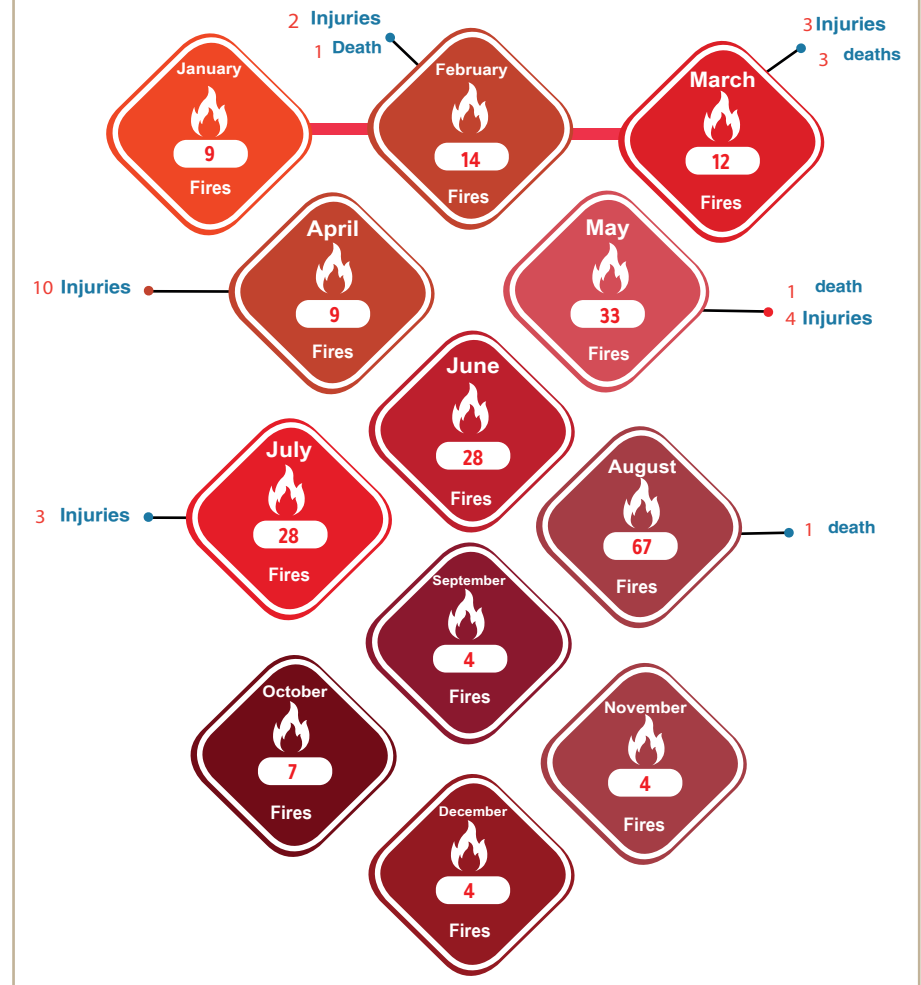
Fire Incidents in the Camps



The spreading of fire incidents in Camps, has several impacts on the IDPs HHs in Ma'rib Governorate. An analysis of cumulative fire records has shown that the number of fire incidents increase significantly during the summer, when the suffering of displaced people is acute due to the Hot Weather in the open desert. The unprecedented rise in the number of fires is causing widespread material and human damages. Despite the efforts of the authorities and humanitarian partners to the suffering of the IDPs the the suffering of the IDPs, the problem remains a major challenge. Executive Unit has monitored the impacts of fire incidents from January to December 2023. Based on this analysis, the Executive Unit has developed a package of proposals, treatments, and recommendations to address fire problem, strengthening security procedures and infrastructure, and reduce the risks.

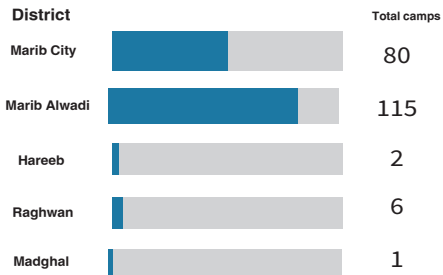


Information Dashboard of Camps

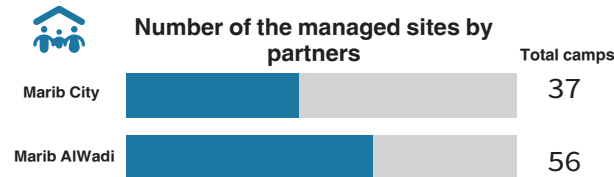
The results of the comprehensive survey conducted by Executive Unit during November 2023, in IDP sites revealed that (34) camps are under threat of eviction, while (146) camps are vulnerable to natural disasters, risks, and pollution, (56) of which are at risk of fires due to emergency and temporary shelter conditions, random electricity connections, and cooking inside tents, among other factors. Additionally, (30) camps are threatened by floods, and (60) camps are at risk of water contamination and disease spread due to the lack of sanitation services, trash accumulation, and solid waste accumulation.



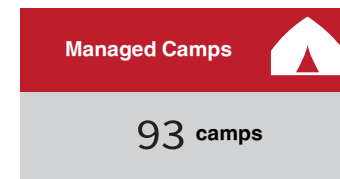
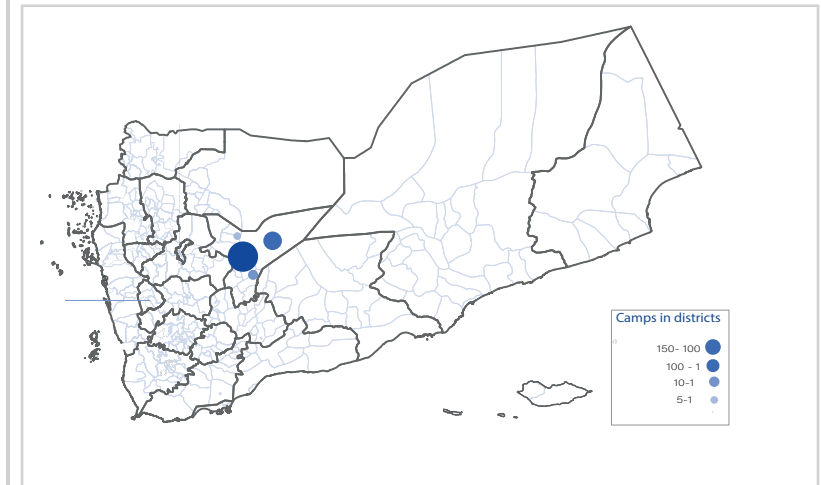
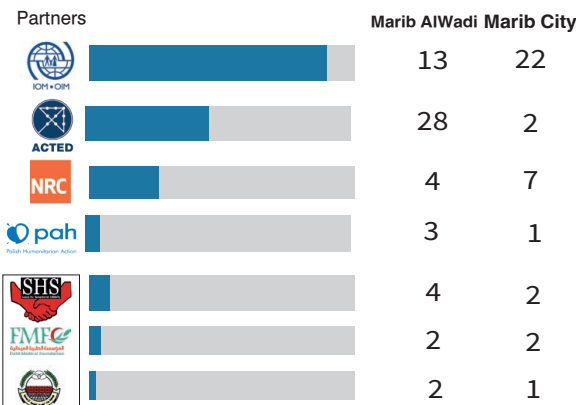
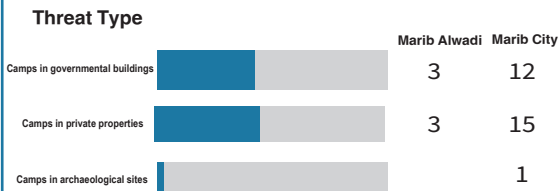
Total Camps in Districts



Managed Sites by Partners

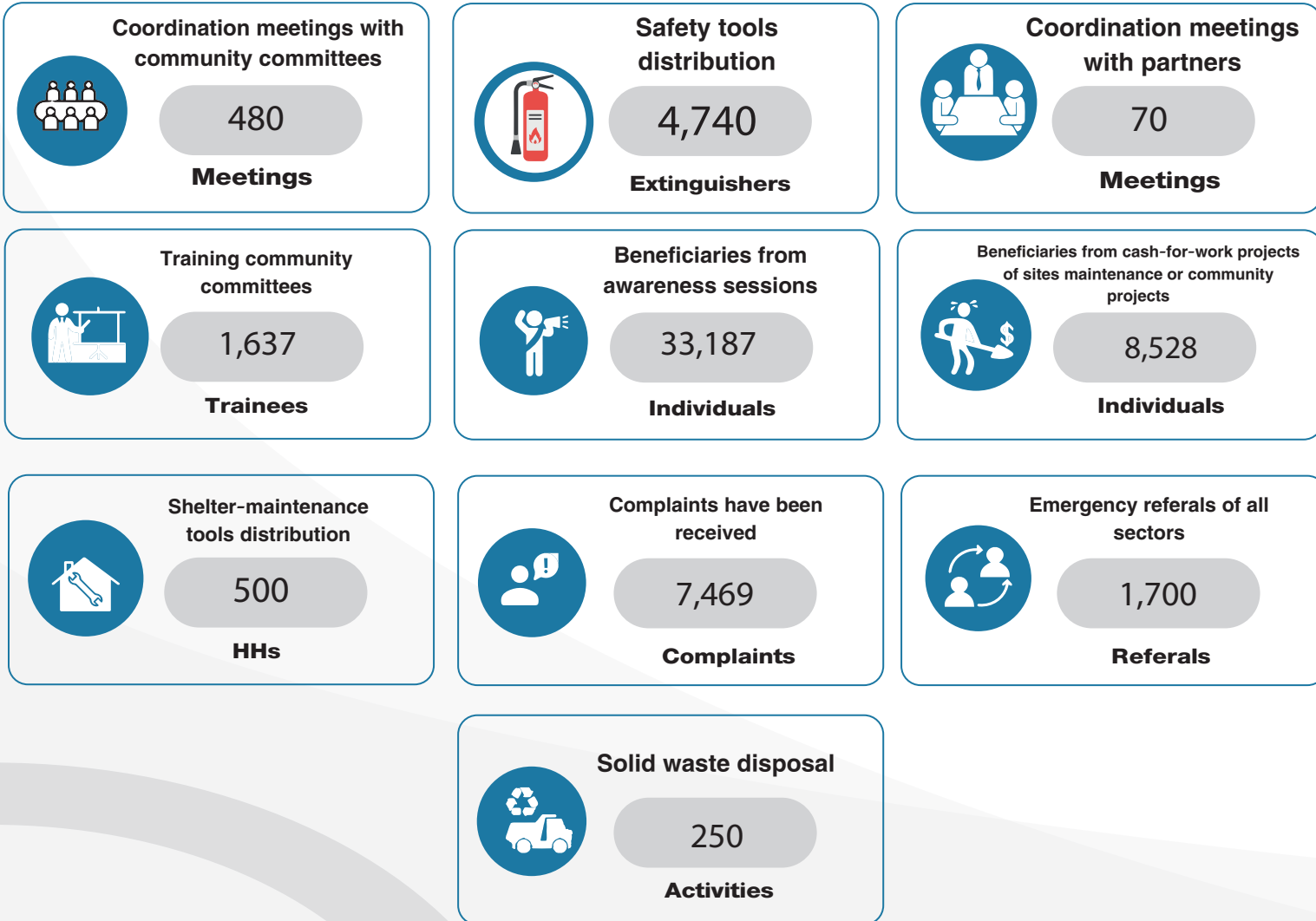


Camps Threatened with Eviction

Recommendations for CCCM Partners

- 1.The dire situation in (111) camps not managed by CCCM partners necessitates an immediate provision of essential resources and capabilities. This critical support will empower the Executive Unit to effectively carry out its administrative role and assume full responsibility for these camps, which are currently grappling with a severe lack of basic services.
- 2.A critical need to invest in a training and capacity development for government agencies, including Executive Unit, in the areas of humanitarian planning and intervention identification and evaluation.
- 3.Adherence to exit strategy by organizations upon completion of project cycles, ensuring the sustainability and continuity of services provided by said projects.
- 4.Establishing an effective communication and coordination mechanism among humanitarian actors, government entities, communities, donors, and third parties is essential for a successful evaluation of partner-implemented activities and maximizing their impact.
- 5.Inclusivity in providing assistance to IDPs in camps and Homes, and covering host community with similar assistance to ensure balance.
- 6.Developing a unified mechanism to ensure equitable distribution of humanitarian assistance for both camp-based and home-based IDPs, with a focus on addressing rental gap and needs to cover rental costs and arrears for IDP households in homes, is imperative. Executive Unit has identified a second wave of displacement from homes to camps, totaling (6000) households, due to their inability to cover rental expenses.
- 7.The urgent need to increase the number CCCM partners in camps lacking such ones.
- 8.Developing contingency plans for effective response to natural disasters, crises, and fire incidents in camps.
- 9.Establishing protection teams and training them to respond to emergencies and disasters
- 10.Establishing a stockpile of essential supplies to effectively respond to emergencies.
- 11.Ensuring the needs of vulnerable groups, including women, children, and persons with disabilities, are adequately addressed.
- 12.Strengthening collaboration among all stakeholders and partners to ensure that needs are met and rapid response is implemented for camp households.
- 13.Activating Early Response and Preparedness Plans (ERP) in Marib Governorate and identifying necessary procedures and strategies for effective response to new emergencies or escalation of existing ones.
- 14.Enhancing coordination levels and conducting advocacy campaigns to mobilize protection partners and implement activities in economic empowerment programs for vulnerable households.
- 15.Ensuring transparency and accountability in all CCCM activities and establishing effective mechanisms for complaints submission, response, and listening to the views and preferences of IDP households.

Recommendations in Food and Agriculture Sector



To address Food and Agricultural needs of displaced households, including those who have not yet received food assistance from World Food Program (WFP), by adding them to food rations and other agricultural support services.

Establishing income-generating projects that enable IDPs to provide their daily needs through self-reliance.

To ensure that the food rations provided by WFP meet the diverse and sufficient nutritional needs of displaced households, by reviewing the components of rations.

To provide displaced people with greater choice and flexibility in the food they receive, by implementing a monthly food voucher method that allows them to purchase food from local merchants.

To address urgent needs of displaced people and focus on permanent projects in food and agricultural sector.

- Broadening the scope of partnership and coordination among stakeholders in protection programs.
- Substantially, increasing the number of economic empowerment projects targeting low-income and impoverished households within camp.
- Achieving overall inclusion of all IDP camps in protection projects.
- Creating safe and friendly spaces and supporting them to address the needs of women and children.
- Establishing community centers that offer protection services for displaced households in camps.

Challenges & Recommendations

Challenges

- 01** A significant shortage in humanitarian support and fund which reflects negatively on the coverage of essential basic needs in all humanitarian sectors.
- 02** The inadequate involvement of relevant official offices in planning, design, and monitoring of humanitarian and developmental projects has resulted in squandering of funds, as well as the loss of valuable resources.
- 03** The number of families being evicted from rented houses has been on the rise due to the deterioration of economic situation and the inability of displaced families to pay rent.
- 04** The lack of available emergency humanitarian stockpile prevents effective response to disasters, emergencies, and potential risks.
- 05** The scarcity of state-owned land for the construction of developmental projects for IDPs constitutes a major obstacle to address the protracted humanitarian crisis in Ma'rib, which continuously receives new influx of displaced households.
- 06** Overemphasis on short-term emergency projects by the donors and organizations has created a dependency culture among displaced households, hindering their self-reliance.
- 07** The limited resources and capabilities of the Executive Unit, due to the lack of operational budget for its office in the governorate.
- 08** The rising numbers of migrants from African continent and their pressing livelihood needs are exacerbated by the lack of attention they receive from international organizations and donors.
- 09** Urgent need of cash-for-rent assistance because most IDP households reside in rented homes due to the absence of supportive projects addressing this necessity, amidst the demand for assistance from international organizations.
- 10** Amidst the escalating housing crisis, a growing number of households find themselves unable to afford rent and in urgent need for individual shelter projects and are at risk of eviction.

Recommendations

- 01** A concerted and intensified effort is required to bolster humanitarian support and funding in order to address the far-reaching consequences of the severe displacement crisis and the burgeoning population of IDPs within the governorate. This necessitates the adoption of strategic frameworks and prioritized interventions aimed at enhancing the capacity and effectiveness of essential services, thereby bridging the yawning gap in humanitarian needs across all sectors.
- 02** Humanitarian plans must be strategically aligned with the highest-priority projects identified in the humanitarian response plan developed by the Local Authorities and official offices in Marib Governorate. This necessitates the active participation of relevant government agencies in planning and design of both humanitarian and development projects across all sectors.
- 03** The establishment of a strategic emergency stockpile is essential to mitigate the effects of disasters, emergencies, and potential risks. This stockpile must be regularly re-evaluated and updated to ensure its continued readiness to effectively respond to any future challenges.
- 04** We urgently urge the government and relevant organizations to establish and equip a dedicated Early Warning Center to effectively monitor, predict, prepare for, and mitigate the risks posed by disasters and climate change.
- 05** We implore the government and Local Authorities to prioritize the allocation of state-owned land for the development of essential projects and the construction of residential cities to provide safe and adequate shelter for the most IDP population. This will be a critical step towards addressing the challenging situation of IDP households currently residing in government service facilities.
- 06** Redirecting donor and organizational support towards recovery projects and long-term solutions across all sectors and humanitarian projects, with a focus on minimizing emergency projects while ensuring alignment with urgent needs.
- 07** Empowering IDP youth through targeted technical education and vocational training programs aligned with market demands and the governorate's strategic economic sectors.
- 08** Streamline and unify humanitarian and development interventions by establishing a single, comprehensive platform and establish an information center to track displacement movements, collect data, and meet IDPs needs.
- 09** Enhancing and supporting resources and capabilities of Executive Unit and approving an expenses and operating budget for its office in Ma'rib Governorate.
- 10** Finding funding projects to support IDP households in rented accommodations and empowering them with livelihood projects, to ensure their ability to cover rental costs in the future once rental assistance ends.
- 12** Growing focus on African migrants by international organizations and donors and addressing their basic needs.
- 13** Organizations undertake initiatives to provide individual shelter projects for families residing outside IDP camps, who are unable to afford housing rental costs.

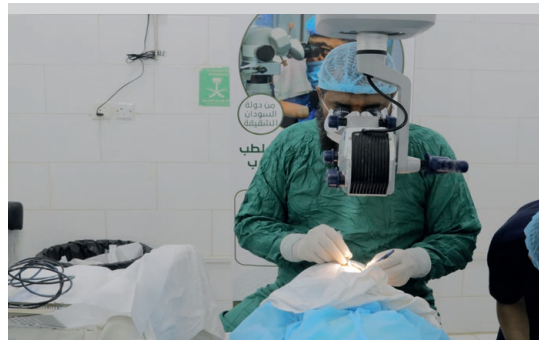
